Educating Newly Resettled Refugees about American Collegiate Opportunities

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Abstract


Refugee youth typically experience interrupted education when they are resettled in the United States. They must quickly adapt to a new education system, and many are unfamiliar with higher education in this country. Further, families are often fearful of authority and lack the networks and knowledge needed to navigate the college selection, application, and admission processes successfully. This project organizes Barry students to create a series of educational films that provide information about resources found within American universities, with Barry University as one example. The films will be provided to Church World Service Miami to share with recently arrived refugee families who will be resettled in this area.

Community Impact Outcomes

- ❖ Share knowledge about American higher educational systems with refugee children and parents
- Support Barry partnerships with Church World Service, Catholic Charities & His House
- Improve access of university resources, such as scholarships, Federal Work-Study, & tutoring to refugee families by building awareness of their existence
- ❖ Build capacity for Church World Service, Catholic Charities and His House by making available educational resource to their programs




Issue Background

Refugees come into the United States without financial recourses for a home, let alone for them to be able to pay for a college education. Even with some support from the government these families still have to find a way to be able to pay for their children's' tuition and related fees, including college application fees. "Research suggests that higher education is vital to ensure well-being, greater socioeconomic integration, and successful resettlement of refugee communities to make a positive contribution to society" (Lenette, 2016). However, because these refugees come from a different ethnic background where college is often not an option after primary education, instead work is their priority, making it more difficult to understand how to begin the college application process. Some don't understand what a FAFSA form is, how to complete ACT/SAT waivers, or how to complete applications.

According to research "there is growing evidence that students from such backgrounds generally fare well at a university given the right support" (Lenette, 2016). With the right support, such as how to write a resume and choose a major, their college applications can be made easier.

Once refugees realize that higher education is related to financial stability, they do as much as they can to be able to continue going to college even if that involves working while they're studying. However these students, "were discouraged...as they worked long hours to pay for food and shelter while they attempted to keep up with their school work" (McBrien, 2010).


Assessment and Evaluation
