The coronavirus took a toll on most students, including our three new members. Both Bennetti and Reyes will be fully remote this fall, but Lee will be in-person. Bennetti chose the remote option for the opportunity to work ahead. Although Reyes prefers to be in-person, she was slightly worried about travel restrictions and about catching the virus itself. Lee is excited to see her teammates inperson again. The only concerns the remote learners have are technical issues and staying in contact with the professors. Otherwise, they are planning to simply adapt to the remote reality.

INTERVIEW WITH THE PRESIDENT

The following is an abridged version of two interviews held with the President of Barry University, Dr. Mike Allen, published with his approval. The first seven questions are from an interview that was held on 4-3-2020 and the last four, marked with asterisks, are from a more recent follow-up interview held on 9-10-2020.

1) To start off, let's get to know the real Dr. Mike Allen. Where are you from, where did you go to university, what did you study, and what is one thing about yourself you think most people don't know?

I'm a New Englander at heart. I was born in Illinois but lived mostly in Connecticut. I attended Trinity College – a smallish school there – and then University of Connecticut for my master's degree and PhD. I'm actually an in introvert by nature, despite my public facing position. I would normally be just as happy to simply blend in, but I am also perfectly comfortable in the leadership roles I have found for myself.

2) Many people say that the journey is much more valuable than the prize at the end. What in your journey inspired you to come here to Barry University?

I'd been in the field of higher ed for almost 25 years, so two factors connected me to Barry. First was the opportunity to work with students who were the first in their family to go to college, which really resonated well with me and my early career and still does today. Second was my previous experience as a university administrator in South Florida, which prepared me for the rigors of the job.

3) Barry, as you know, has built an incredibly rich history since it was founded 80 years ago. What is it like being the first male president of a previously all female university?

This has got to be the question I've been asked most since I was hired. Most importantly, the values important to me are very much the same as those held by the Adrian Dominican Sisters. I realized very early on in interview process that there was just a really strong alignment. The Adrian Dominican Sisters have been incredibly friendly and warm in welcoming me, as has the entire Barry University Community. You mentioned Barry's rich history, and part of that is a tradition of strong and thoughtful mission-driven leadership. I am very honored to carry on this tradition.

4) You seem to me to be a man with a plan. What is your vision for Barry's future in the next 5-10 years?

I have a very different answer now than I would have given three or four weeks ago. Truthfully, it's hard to tell what the world will look like when the dust settles. There are many unknowns and unpredictable variables. Critically, I think there will be a re-evaluation of priorities in all of higher education, the country, and across the world after the new reality emerges. In broadest terms, my priorities up to this point have been growing the external presence of the university. We have around 65 thousand alum who mostly have fond feelings about Barry but the percentage of alumni who continue to engage with the university is low and we need to grow in that aspect. I want Barry to have strong positive presence in South Florida. And I want to continue to build relationships between the university and outside partners in our community.

5) I know that a number of students here are hungry for leadership opportunities and working with the president seems like it would have huge potential for that. Is there anything that the Honors Program and student organizations in general can do to work more closely with your office?

There are two things we are working to start up which will definitely help with that. The first is a Student Leadership Council - a committee of sorts which has diverse widespread representation from all the various clubs and groups at Barry. I want to have a representative body of students to get feedback and ideas about new initiatives and programs and to share information with. The second is the President's Society. Students will apply for this highly selective leadership opportunity and essentially act as ambassadors for the university. Big events for university donors might have members of the President's Society greeting guests and sharing Barry's story, among other potential duties.

6) The Covid-19 pandemic is quite the issue to deal with right out the gate of your time here. In these unusual times, how do you feel being at the wheel, so to speak, and guiding the university through the pandemic?

I honestly feel very comfortable in this position of leadership. I have been through numerous crises in the past which have taught me a lot about how to handle delicate and urgent situations - nothing of this magnitude of course but nobody has. At the end of the day we all have to rely on our core values and principles. For me that means being very forward thinking, being thoughtful, kind, and compassionate for students, faculty, staff, and alumni, being very honest and transparent about what we are doing as a university and why. The hardest part of this situation are the unknowns which are always unsettling. The best anyone can do in a leadership role is communicate well, thoroughly, and openly and I am entirely prepared to do that.

7) I'm sure you are swamped these days by people asking for your comment or input, but do you have any words of wisdom or advice for all the students, faculty and staff who are weathering this storm and keeping the university running?

First and foremost, stay safe and stay healthy. I think everybody understands true gravity of the situation now, but it is especially important for the Barry community to adhere to physical distancing guidelines, wear face coverings and follow all the practices recommended by health experts and required here at Barry while we get through this. The way everyone has adjusted to this has been extraordinary; being able to convert to a remote learning environment in the course of a week is incredible. Everyone's flexibility and willingness to adapt has been amazing and I really want to convey the strong sense of gratitude I feel. The only further thing I can ask is that we all continue be patient and stick together.

*8) Over the past several months, much has change in the world around us and in our expectations for the future. What has been the biggest shift in perspective or direction that you have had to make?

I'd say the biggest change has been our need to become incredibly flexible. Academic institutions have always functioned in a certain way and learning to be flexible and patient has been all of our greatest goal. Something I think we have discovered in the midst of this turmoil is just how much people enjoy being in person around each other, and how much they miss it when that aspect of their lives is removed. For some time now online schooling was thought to be the 'way of the future', and it may still be to an extent, but we have all learned how much we value a personal touch in our education.

*9) I was intrigued to read your statement about the founding of the Barry University Anti-Racism and Equality Coalition. What is your personal perspective on the search for equality and fairness in the university setting?

This issue has been a real priority both for me and for the university. We at Barry are uniquely positioned to make an impact on our community and the lives of our students in this sector and I think we are all working really hard to make whatever positive change we can. When I say we are uniquely positioned, I am referring to the rich and diverse ethnic and racial makeup of our university community, our long-standing commitments to inclusivity and fighting for social justice, and the sheer talent among us, in our students, faculty, staff and alumni network. We are in a place to be at the forefront of this work, and the Coalition will coordinate and lead our efforts.

*10) What are some of the concrete goals of this committee and what changes can Barry students expect to see in their campus experiences?

There are three main goals of the BU AREC at the moment. The first is to create a network of support for students who are struggling with the trauma, pain and confusion caused by some horrific acts of violence in the US. We want to make sure we are making resources available to those who need them. The second goal is to educate ourselves and our community on how to better interact and engage with racial topics. And thirdly, it is our goal to utilize all of the incredible expertise we have on campus to make a tangible difference. We have a wealth of students and faculty with incredible ideas and we just want to empower them to create change with these ideas. As far as what students can expect, they can expect to be engaged. We are really looking to have our students as active participants in social change and social justice in alignment with our university values. We want us all to be part of the movement towards positive change.

*11) In times of uncertainty, I am sure you would agree that it is important not to lose sight of the things which inspire and motivate us. What is one thing you are most excited for in the upcoming academic year?

That's actually a really easy question; I am excited for us all to be back together, in-person and also engaging virtually in a really seamless manner. I am a people person and the opportunity to have everyone back together and able to be with and learn from each other is something I'm really looking forward to. I hope we have all learned not to take things like being around each other for granted and to appreciate having the chance to be together and learn together. I think we will all have a new appreciation for the routine things like in-person commencement ceremonies and other live events, when we are able to resume all of those, and a new appreciation for the connections we have with people in general.

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
