Position Wanted

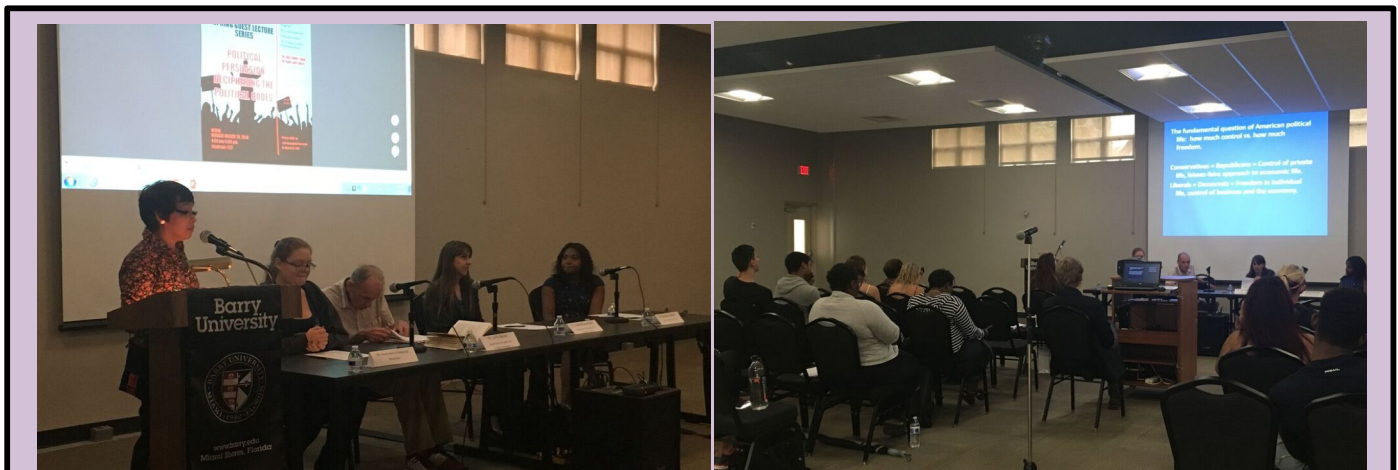

Guest Lecture Series

The spring Guest Lecture Series (GLS) took place on March 28th and was a great success. The topic of this semester's GLS was Political Persuasion: Deciphering the Political Codes. The event had a great turnout (the HPSAB organizers even had to cut questions to remain within time limitations!). The three panelists included Dr. Larry Byrne, Dr. Leah Blumenfeld, and Dr. Nickesia Gordon, all highly praised professors of Barry University. The panel topics included political development and tactics, campaign promises, and the impact of today's social media usage on politics. Each panelist provided a unique and helpful viewpoint on the aforementioned key topics, as each specializes in a different field of study. Dr. Larry Byrne, of the Department of English and Foreign Languages, explored the ideas of rhetoric, motivation and persuasion to vote using Aristotle's three primary proofs, the idea of control versus freedom, and more. Dr. Leah Blumenfeld of the Department of History and Political Science drove home the idea of government structure and its role in passing bills as well as the media's role in shaping the news. Lastly, Dr. Nickesia Gordon, of the Department of Communication, focused largely on social media topics such as the medium as the message, social construction of archetypes and stereotypes, and media ownership's role in politics. Arguably, the most important take-away from this event was the importance in being an informed and educated voter and doing one's "homework" prior to making decisions. We thank all who organized, came, or participated in this event for their time and attention and cannot wait for another successful event next fall.



Pay It Forward Collage

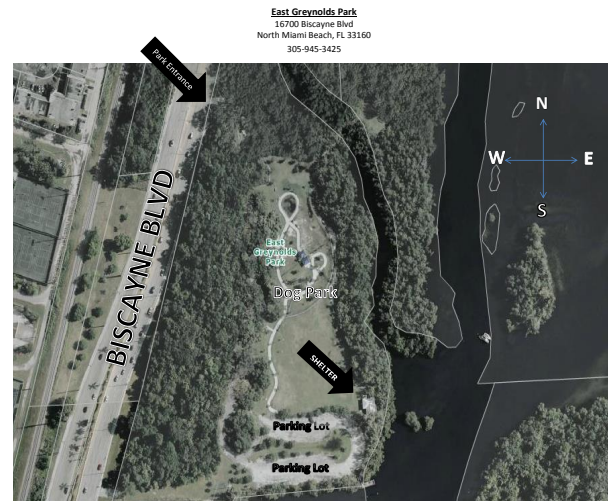

Earth Day

Earth Day has annually taken place on April 22nd since its humble beginning in 1970. At a time when people were oblivious to the seemingly important environmental concerns, Rachel Carson's book, *Silent Spring*, opened the eyes of many in 1962. The book sold over 500,000 copies in more than 20 countries and addressed many unspoken issues and alarming links. Earth Day 1970 became a front-page story and gave the much-needed attention to the emerging awareness. The day was an idea of Gaylord Nelson, a Wisconsin senator who hoped to bring environmental protection to the United States' political agenda. April 22, 1970 was a monumental day that bridged the gap between the many different groups fighting for common values (groups against oil spills, polluting factories, pesticides, the loss of wilderness, you name it). Twenty million Americans partook in the first ever Earth Day, and by the end of 1970 the United States Environmental Protection Agency as well as three acts (Clean Air, Clean Water, and Endangered Species Acts) had come into existence. Twenty years after its creation, Earth Day went global for the first time. This time, though, the efforts involved the help of 200 million people from 141 countries, representing all continents. Each year brings more environmental efforts, projects, and acts into life. The fight for a clean environment continues today, and we are all needed more than ever to bring the desired changes to our home, planet Earth. Get involved this year by joining the movement, giving to the cause, or even just spreading the word. Local events include Mother Earth Music and Arts Festival, Moonlight Garden Tour at Vizcaya Museum & Gardens (a beautiful location that HP visited together just this semester!), and many clean-up initiatives throughout South Florida and its state parks. Barry University also celebrates Earth Day annually with activities, presentations, movie screening, and a vendor fair to instill awareness within students, faculty, and staff. Senior Salute

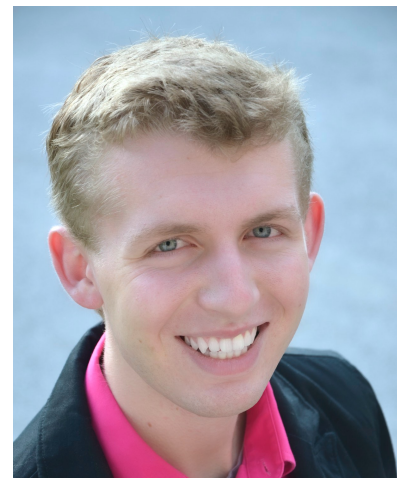
Alek Sayers

Where are you from and what high school did you attend?

What is your field of study and what drew you to this field?

I am studying theatre with a focus on acting, and intend to work as an actor and eventually own and run a children's workshop someday. I was drawn to theatre by the camaraderie and beauty of the art I encountered while working on high school productions and directing children's theatre.

What is your favorite aspect of the Honors Program?

My favorite part of the Honors Program is the Guest Lecture Series we host every semester! It is always a lot of legwork, but I love exploring new and relevant topics with speakers from a wide variety of fields and disciplines.

What is your research topic for your honors thesis?

My thesis, titled *The Persuasive Power of Theatre: The Experience of Live Action Versus the Written Word*, concerns the effect a performance has upon an audience member who attends a live theatrical performance. I sought theatre as a career because I was enamored by the ability to tell stories that change people, and I've been researching and compiling how thinkers throughout history have believed theatre should and does effect the audience. I also explore a contemporary example using the Fine Arts Department's recent production of *Our Town*, and through surveys I have compared how people who saw the live performance react to those who have only ever read the play.

What are your hobbies and passions?

Acting has quickly traveled from being a hobby to a career in a short four years (but I wouldn't have it any other way!) I am a grade-A tabletop gamer; I can occupy myself with Magic the Gathering, Dungeons and Dragons, or Settlers of Catan all day long. However, when I step outside, there is nothing I love more than playing tennis, soccer, hiking, or downhill skiing in the winter!

What has been your most memorable college experience?

There are many that deserve a mention here, but I know we're used to reading BuzzFeed articles, so I'll include just one. I've performed in the Broad Auditorium many times since getting to school, but one of my most memorable performances wasn't for theatre. I performed with the music department's ensemble choir for an evening of the Gospel Mass' entirety, and it was an absolute joy. What do you plan to do after graduation?
