A Christmas Story for All

Although it's widely considered by many to be the celebration of the birth of Christ in today's day and age, the celebration of Christmas as we know it stems from the traditions of several different cultures. In the Norse country, it was known as Yule during the winter solstice, when males in the families would bring evergreens into the home as a sign of life, and a log would be burned in hopes of good fortune. Ancient Romans celebrated Saturnalia, an orgy of food and festivals in honor of the harvest god Saturn.

But did you know that early Christians didn't know when Jesus was born? It wasn't until the 3rd century that December 25th was chosen as a date to celebrate their savior's birth, a date that coincided with other pagan rituals that persisted the test of time. This led religious leaders to oppose Christmas celebrations.



Christmas as we know it didn't start until the 1800's, when Prince Albert of Germany brought to England the tradition of decorating evergreen trees in 1848. Sending Christmas cards started around relatively the same time. Giving presents originates from the religious event of baby Jesus receiving gifts from the three kings, but this significance has changed due the rise of the industrial revolution, the three kings turning into the most famous of all Christmas characters, Santa Claus. The big man in red is based on Saint Nicholas of Myra, a Dutch saint known for giving gifts referred to as SinterKlaas. A poet Clement Moore reimagined Saint Nicholas as Santa Clause when he wrote the poem, "A Night Before Christmas," which has been traditionally read on the eve of Christmas.



"Lobbyist: The Influence Surrounding Marijuana Laws and Regulations"

My topic on marijuana laws has stayed constant throughout the entire process. As I did more and more research, I realized I wanted to complete my research on a topic that is not normally discussed. Working with Dr. Perez, he opened the door to my paper with an idea – which I ran with.

In my paper, I focused on the various groups in Washington, D.C. fighting for marijuana laws – both legalization and prohibition. I began by focusing on the history of marijuana laws – detailing the where, when, and why marijuana first became illegal. I explained the major Acts that changed the course of drug policy in the early 20th century – the Harrison Act, the Marijuana Tax Act, and the Controlled Substance Act. I, then, discussed the current status of marijuana in the United States.

Since 1996, many laws and regulations at the state level have decriminalized marijuana possession. Medical marijuana has set the precedent for legalizing both medical and recreational use of the illicit substance. In 1996, California accepted medical marijuana as a form of treatment for various illnesses – setting an example other states have since followed. In 2012, Washington State and Colorado legalized the recreational usage of marijuana – creating laws and regulations for their citizens to follow.

I discussed the role of lobbyists – elaborating on the influence lobbyists have on our politicians. Through highly paid lobbyists, politicians are provided with information on various aspects of American society. I also discussed the lobbyists in Washington in favor of continuing the prohibition of marijuana. Police Unions, Private Prison Corporations, Prison Guard Unions, the Alcohol and Beer Industries, and the Pharmaceutical Corporations are the main players in lobbying against legalization. These industries have significant reasons – mainly stemming from money – to keep marijuana illegal. I discussed the various individuals, groups, organizations, and industries in favor of legalizing the recreational use of marijuana.

Thus, this thesis examined how and why large interest groups endorse lobbyists in Washington, DC today for the continual persuasion, amongst politicians and law makers, in sustaining the prohibition of cultivation, consumption, and distribution of marijuana.

Among the panelists were two police chiefs (Miami Beach Chief Daniel Oates and Miami Dade Director J.D. Patterson) and Dr. Laura Finley. Shade Lovett assumed her competent role as the moderator. Dr. Fernando Perez was the respondent and led the Q & A session.




The efforts from both the panel and the respondent contributed to a lively Q & A that lasted for 40 minutes. Needless to say, this year's GLS turned out to be one of the most engaged panel discussions for HP. The panelists and respondent's participation, preparation, and enthusiasm left the audience, particularly the students, wanting to learn more about this topic. The students in attendance were also treated with a one-on-one interaction with the two leading Police Chiefs. Having Director Patterson and Chief Oates on campus was among the very best community policing efforts that is likely to have a positive long-term effects among the students.

We owe the success to everyone involved and those in the audience for this engaged presentation, open-ended dialogue, and thoughtful questions. We also received constructive feedback from two panelists and an audience member. Miami Beach Chief Oates was happy that it all worked out well for what we wanted to achieve and indicated that he would be interested in returning to future GLS. Dr. Finley thought we



did a great job in organizing this important dialogue and appreciated the invitation to return to the GLS panel. Although Dr. Sean Foreman thought more students would have attended the panel on such an important topic, he commented that a time of day for an event might have kept some students from attending.

We look forward to organizing our next GLS and welcome topic ideas from HP students and faculty.

Farewell from Samantha Lopes




As I reflect on the last four years at Barry University, some of my best moments are from just being in the Honors Program. Moving miles away from my


















Senior Salute

From Presler Maxius:


It was nice to meet and work with Shenea and Lizandra. I love the great job they did with the newsletter. I wish them the best in whatever they attempt to do after graduation.
