Director's Welcome!



For those that are new to the program, could you tell us a little bit about yourself?

My name is Dr. Pawena Sirimangkala, and I am the Honors Program (HP) Director and Associate Professor of Communication. I earned my doctorate degree in Communication with a specialization in Intercultural Communication from Kent State University, Kent, Ohio, in 1993. What are you currently working on or what are your research interests? During my sabbatical in fall 2016, I traveled to Taichung, Taiwan to advance my Chinese-Mandarin and successfully passed Band A of the Test of Chinese as a Foreign Language (TOCFL, a standardized test developed for nonnative speakers of Chinese). My current research examines the Chinese identities as portrayed in contemporary's Chinese media and through the Chinese's Writing Systems. While I was first introduced to China's Simplified Writing System, I am now devoted to advancing my Chinese reading comprehension, under Taiwan's Traditional Writing System. Having lived in both China and Taiwan, my research focus is mainly to write about the Chinese cultural characteristics from these two Chinese cultural perspectives. My current goal is also to pass TOCFL's Band B and have a command of up to 1,000 Chinese characters.

Could you tell us a little about your career before Barry?

Prior to coming to Barry University in 1997, I taught at Kent State University and University of Arizona.

What does your job entail now? At

Barry, I teach both communication and two of the HP courses (HUM 199H and HUM 300H) and enjoy traveling with HP students to present their research papers at national and regional Honors conferences. In the past, I directed five Study Abroad Programs at Barry (codirected the Thailand Study Abroad Program in 2006 and 2007 and directed the Honors Program's China Study Abroad in 2010, 2011, and 2012).

What are current goals for HP

students? To encourage more HP students to get involved in all aspects of the program and to travel to present papers at the Honors conferences.

Why I joined HPSAB:

Being able to give back to HP by being part of HPSAB is a great way of showing how thankful I am and what an honor it is to be a part of a group of young men and women who strive to be the best they can be.

Hurricane Irma Flurry

This past September, many of the Caribbean islands, along with the state of Florida, were struck with what has been called a historical cyclone that made history – Hurricane Irma. The aftermath of this powerful storm will forever mark our history, having left many without power and water for weeks, and others without homes.

But while the storm itself left considerable damage, the flurry caused before it hit left many people stranded without a way of leaving, grocery stores without necessary food items, and gas stations without gas. And many of our Honors Program members struggled with getting out or reaching their family members.

Presler Maxius: During Irma, I could not get in contact with my family in Haiti. My mom, my sister, and my brother live there. So while everyone was evacuating and going to shelters, I was hopelessly trying to figure out if my family was safe. I did not reach them until about two weeks after the hurricane had passed over Florida. The whole experience was very emotionally draining.

Chantel Drysdale: Hurricane Irma was an experience that I would never want to go through ever again. Fortunately, I did not have to witness any of the physical damage that it caused, because I was able to fly back home. However, trying to get a flight out of Florida was a huge hassle. I had to call and search online for a plane ticket for several hours. Just when I thought things were hopeless and I would have to stay in a shelter, I got a plane ticket. The ticket was from Fort Lauderdale, Florida to Albany, New York. I live in Bronx, New York, which is three hours from Albany, New York. Therefore, I had to take an Uber to Fort Lauderdale Airport, then a plane to Albany Airport, a cab to Albany train station, a train to Penn Station in Manhattan where my parents were finally able to pick me up. The whole thing was a big ordeal, but fortunately, I made it home safely.

Rhasheda Weir: During Hurricane Irma, I had to evacuate my apartment and move in with my sister. My apartment was located close to an evacuation zone; and so to ensure my safety, I packed up my things and left. Thankfully, I did not lose any personal belongings to the storm; however, I had no power or cell service for couple of days.

Cheryl Frazier entered the Honors Program in Fall of 2011 and graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in Philosophy from Barry University in May 2015. Her Senior Honors Thesis title was "A culture of communication: A critical examination of modern implications of social networking sites." Cheryl also served on HPSAB (2011 – 2015) as Co-Chair (2013 – 2015) and Historian and the first HP Newsletter Editor (2012). Here is what she says:


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"Since I graduated from Barry, I have begun pursuing my PhD in philosophy at the University of Oklahoma (OU) in Norman, Oklahoma. Norman is a relatively small town in comparison to Miami, so moving here was quite the culture shock. I also had to adjust to my first real winter in years, but have loved getting to experience all 4 seasons again!

In May I completed the Master's degree portion of my program, so I now have approximately 3-4 years left until I have my PhD. I plan to specialize in applied ethics and the philosophy of art, both of which I learned to love thanks to former HP faculty member Dr. Ruth Tallman. In the summer of 2016 I had the privilege of attending the Sherwin B. Nuland Summer Institute in Bioethics at Yale University, where I received the Pollard Prize for Outstanding Graduate Student Research for my research on university responses to student suicide attempts.

Over this past summer I have been busy doing research on potential topics for my dissertation. I hope to write on something involving mental health and the importance of art in treating mental illness. I was also recently published in a chapter of the book *Hamilton and Philosophy: Revolutionary Thinking*! Outside of research I serve as my university's Minorities and Philosophy chapter representative, and I am a cocoach of our Ethics Bowl Team. I've also enjoyed my time making new friends and exploring life in the Midwest!

The friendships I formed while in the Honors Program have truly become lifelong friendships!"
